

Sports Premium spending 2022-2023

Whittingham Primary Academy has 397 pupils enrolled from Reception to Year 6 (October 2022)

This means the school is entitled to: £19,860 estimated.

This additional funding has been made available directly to schools to improve the provision of Physical Education (PE) and Sport for all children. Schools have the freedom to determine how best to use this funding to improve the quality and breadth of PE and sport and in turn enhance participation level and attainment. At Whittingham Primary Academy we have been allocated approximately £16,000 for the academic year 2022-2023. This money will be used to enhance and broaden our PE provision, making it exciting for all children and encouraging lifelong participation in sport and physical activity.
