This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

The Primary PE and sport premium should not be used to fund capital spend projects; the school's core budget should fund these. Further detail on capital expenditure can be found in the updated <a href="Primary PE">Primary PE</a> and sport premium guidance.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	58%	Children were able to swim but struggled to swim 25m. There are children with a EHCPs who have not met this requirement – they have learned to get into to the water but cannot swim the required distance. There have been some children absent and at times culture differences.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	68%	Children were able to swim but struggled to swim 25m. There are children with a EHCPs who have not met this requirement – they have learned to get into to the water but cannot swim the required distance. There have been some children absent and at times culture differences.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	58%	Children have a good understanding of the instructions went over this in great detail. Some children have confidence but require a bit more practice.
